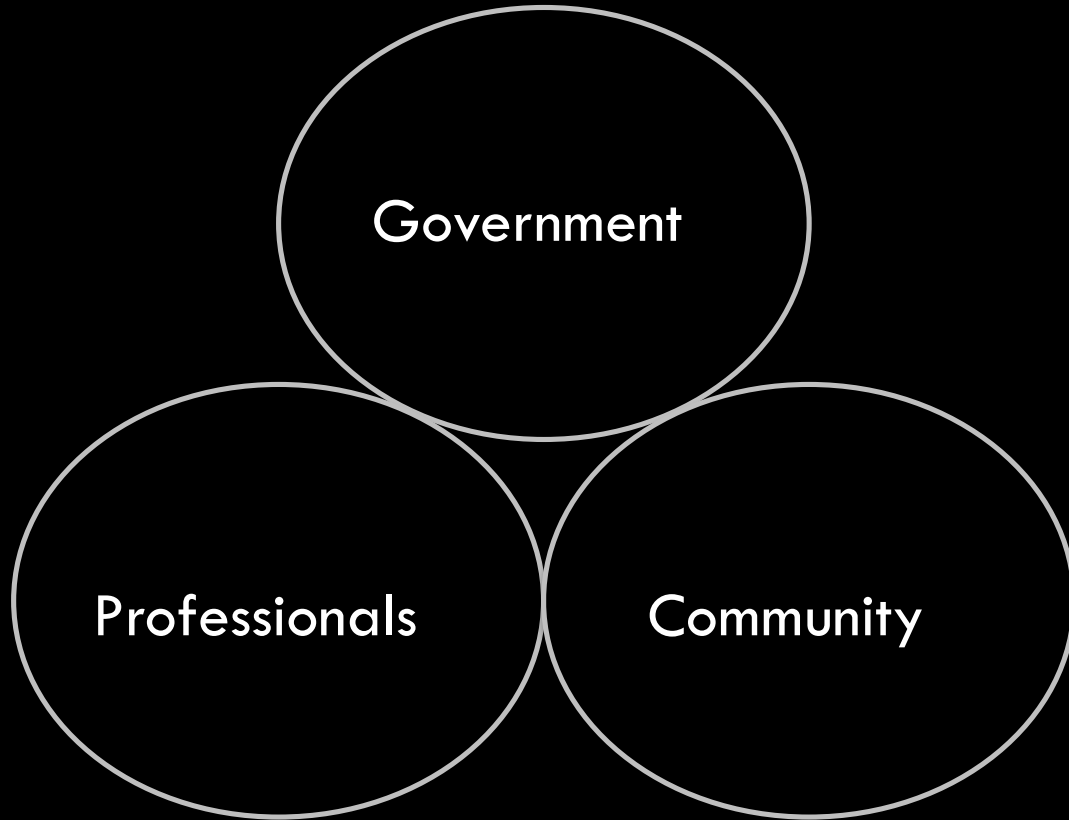

Recommendations

- 1. Start equally valuing heritage sites and the surrounding landscapes that influenced their formations.**
- 2. More resources made available for the preservation of heritage when found in combination with important natural resources.**

Landscapes currently face unexpected threats that need to be managed by applying new approaches to safeguarding the relationship between cultural and natural heritage by sharing practical experiences.

An approach is needed that is based on the protection of human rights and on strengthening new and traditional knowledge and local governance.
